Cornwall Council update *by Cornwall Councillor Martyn Alvey*

By the time you read this, we will have some idea how the fundamental changes to the lockdown rules which will come into force on Saturday, July 4th have gone. You can find [more information here](#). The feeling I get from talking to residents is that many still intend to stay away from pubs and restaurants, at least until they see how things are going. People fear that there will be a significant element of society that lacks the common sense required to socialise sensibly – let's hope they don't ruin things for the rest! The ability for people to stay over in hotels, campsites and bed and breakfast also marks a significant easing of the current restrictions, but I know that for many it's 'too much – too soon'. However, things are far from 'returning to normal', for example, I have friends who have been planning their wedding at the end of July for over a year now. Their 'big day' has now been constrained to a simple ceremony with 30 attendees and no reception – but at least it can now go ahead.



The opening up of tourism will need to be balanced alongside the need to keep residents safe, and Cornwall Council will be working with local businesses to ensure that is the case. There is specific guidance for each sector on how to open up and trade safely and Cornwall Council has been running a series of popular sector specific online 'Workshops' to assist a whole range of businesses prepare and carry out the necessary risk assessments. However, the Council wants to reiterate how important it is for people to keep on doing those basic things to keep safe, like washing your hands, maintaining your social distance and being especially considerate to those residents who are cautious, when you are out and about.

Cornwall and Isles of Scilly Local Outbreak Management Plan

I'm sure that we have all seen in the news about the Covid19 outbreak in Leicester and the reintroduction of restriction in the City. To put this into some context, as at 1 July, there were estimated to be 144 Covid19 cases per 100,000 people in the City. In Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly the rate stands at just 0.7. Nonetheless, it's important that we have plans in place should an outbreak occur and to that end a comprehensive plan has been published. The Local Outbreak Management plan was developed in close cooperation with other Local Authorities in the South West to make sure it meets the needs of Cornwall's residents, but also fits in with the work of neighbouring authorities. It outlines how close partnerships between local organisations like public health, the police, schools and care homes, alongside businesses and key industries such as tourism, will work. As part of the governance arrangements a Local Outbreak Engagement Board has been set up which I, along with several other Cornwall Councillors have been invited to sit on. The Board will be responsible for political oversight of the local delivery of the plan and response and Communicating and engaging with residents and communities

New 'click-and-collect' Library Service

From the 6th July Libraries will partially reopen, but you won't yet be invited in to browse the shelves. But an ingenious half-way house solution will enable browsing online, clicking to order your selections, then collecting them in person from your local library's foyer or reception. You can return loaned books at the library entrance too – but please don't overwhelm staff and volunteers by all rushing back in the first week! And the good news is that there won't be any fines for overdue books until the end of September, or indeed any cash transactions at all. Returned books will be 'quarantined' for a period to ensure they are safe to touch, and the borrowing and return protocols will mean safe hand contact between staff and customers. Libraries in Cornwall come in all shapes and sizes, and since devolution are managed by different councils and community groups. So, a method of restoring book loans they could all adopt without creating social distancing prob-

lems was needed – hence ‘click and collect’. More details can be found by following this link: [Cornwall Libraries welcome you back with a new ‘click-and-collect’ service](#)

Face masks

And finally a reminder that it’s currently compulsory to wear face coverings on public transport, with more people being to use buses and trains once more, social distancing becomes harder to maintain. Face masks are also encouraged in any setting that social distancing at only 1m or in indoor situations is a challenge. It is important that people realise this does not mean wearing a clinical mask, and that any covering, including a scarf, would be suitable. People are reminded to follow the hygiene rules when removing their masks and are advised to wash their mask after each use. A video demonstrating how to make your own mask [can be found here](#).

It would really help us if you could please phone us (via 07904 547822) to book a prescription delivery on the day that you order your prescription so that this gives us notice and enables us to plan our volunteer rota, of course if your medication is an urgent prescription needed the same day we will do our very best to help get it to you.

Spar shopping orders are still able to be made the same day (via 07379 241780)

The prescription and shopping lines will now only be manned on weekdays between 9am and 12 noon.

Please do ask if you have any queries about the service and make sure you stay safe as you go out and about more.

Thought for the week

The Common Good by Revd Dr Jonathan Rowe

Our economy is creaking back to life and thoughts are turning to the pros and cons of having more people in Cornwall. More economic activity: good. A greater risk of COVID transmission: bad.

But matters cannot be distilled so easily. There are not only private goods and public goods, but also a common good. 'The common good' is a term which has found renewed currency in our day, often employed in political debate as an exhortation to look beyond individual advantage to the good of others. Yet it is more than a banner to encourage social solidarity. It has deep philosophical and religious roots which give it three distinct senses. Each has its own implications, which I've highlighted with a question:

First, the common good is an *aim*, the good common to a community: who do we want to be?

Second, the common good is a *practice*, that is, collective activity for a common purpose: what are we doing together?

Third, the common good refers to the *conditions* necessary for everyone to fulfil their individual objectives: how can we live so that everyone flourishes?

This rich and multifaceted conception of the common good clearly shows that it is not a utopian ideal to be imposed by one group on another. As life returns to a 'new normal' the idea of the common good raises questions about the sort of community we want to build. How will we respond?

Our playgrounds are now open again!

We are delighted to be able to open all our playgrounds from Saturday 4th July 2020.

Please help us to keep them safe for everyone by adhering to the measures we have had to put in place to make them 'Covid safe' to enable them to be opened.

Notices, like the one shown below are displayed on the gate of each park.

Many thanks for your co-operation.

✗ Please do not enter the park if you, or anyone in your household are showing symptoms, or are self-isolating

✓ All visitors should wash or sanitise their hands before entering the play area, and again on leaving

✓ If possible, please wipe down equipment before use with anti-bacterial wipes

✗ Please do not enter if the facility appears busy, and avoid equipment if already occupied or the maximum recommended number of children are using it

✓ Children should be supervised carefully to maintain good hygiene and to ensure children wait their turn to use equipment where it is safe to do so

✗ If possible, ensure that all visitors avoid shouting (to stop the virus being spread via droplets like it can be with sneezing), touching faces or mouths and observe social distancing rules from anyone outside of their household or support bubble

✗ Do not eat food or smoke in the play area

✗ Please remember that the Covid-19 virus can survive longer on internal hard surfaces, so if possible entering tube slides, play tunnels or small playhouses should be avoided.

✓ Please take all of your PPE and litter home with you.



Devoran Community Library will be open again from Monday 6th July

We have had to put various measures in place to ensure the library is 'Covid safe' please help us by adhering to these. **Please note the new opening hours – 9am to 12 noon weekdays**

To adhere to social distancing only one household/bubble will be allowed in the library area at a time.

At the present time there are no deliveries from the Cornwall Council mobile library van and therefore you cannot unfortunately order books online for delivery to the Devoran library.

You can still choose from the selection of books already on the shelves and we would ask that any books that you pick up to browse or are returning after being borrowed are placed in the 'quarantine' box, they will be returned to the shelves after 72 hours to ensure any virus on them is no longer present.

The coffee machine has also been removed and we would ask that all visitors to the library use the hand sanitiser provided, surface wipes will also be available to wipe down books.

Not all disabilities are visible

Some are not immediately obvious, such as learning difficulties, mental health as well as mobility, speech, visual or hearing impairments. Living with

a hidden disability can make daily life more demanding for many people, but it can be difficult for others to recognise, acknowledge or understand the challenges you face.



Be visible when you want to be

Wearing the Hidden Disabilities Sunflower discreetly indicates to people around you including staff, colleagues and health professionals that you may need additional support, help or a little more time.

Great Western Railway, GWR is now participating in the scheme too. This is something we had been planning for a while, but are introducing now to particularly support those with hidden disabilities who are not able to wear face coverings.

Sunflower Lanyards will be available free of charge by phoning the GWR Passenger Assistance team on freephone 0800 197 1329, by emailing passenger.assist@GWR.com or by contacting GWR on social media. Once travel restrictions allow, the lanyards will also be made available from station ticket offices.

The Parish Council have requested an amendment to the timetable to allow residents of Feock village to use the 493 bus to get to Trelissick Gardens in the morning from the village which has now been put in place in the new timetable. The Parish Council are however aware of the diversion currently in place in Feock village where the bus is not able to serve the route past Green Close and the Church due to overgrown hedges/trees and are working with Cornwall Council to urgently reinstate this route.

Loe Beach Café opens on Saturday 4 July from 11am—4pm!

For the first two weeks we are opening for weekends only while we test the water with opening during the strange time.

We are taking the C19 situation very seriously & protecting our staff & customers is our top priority. The Loe Beach Cafe experience will be very different this year because of Covid 19, so please bear with us, be kind & if you see something you think we should know, please tell us, we are all new to this & are trying to get everything right & be safe.

The main change is, this year we are takeaway only.. We would love to welcome you in to our lovely cafe but we are so little inside that social distancing is difficult, so we have set up a one way order & pickup system where you access the cafe at the SIDE GATE, order there, pick up orders at the front door of the decking & exit through the front garden. We have lots of signage to remind us all about social distancing while queuing which we would like to keep at 2metres where possible.

When the cafe is busy, we will recommend sending ONE PERSON from your family or group to order & collect where possible because it reduces the gathering of people in our relatively small garden.

We have undertaken Covid 19 online training and carried out risk assessments. We have also given our staff team covid 19 awareness training, but please be aware that C19 is an ever changing beast & new guidelines come through quite often so things may be subject to change.

We have gone through all the Government guidance & made changes to our layout including our socially distanced queue set up, a screened area where you order at the stable door & quite a few signs which we kindly ask that you read, plus many more operational changes with safety against infection in mind.

Despite all of this, we are looking forward to catching up with you soon.. The layout & open times may be different but we still have the same great locally produced ice cream, coffee, goodies & view!
