Easing of Lockdown Restrictions with effect from 4 July 2020

Prime Minister Boris Johnson announced on 23 June further changes to lockdown measures in England to enable people to see more of their friends and family, help businesses get back on their feet and get people back in their jobs. From **Saturday 4th July**, the Prime Minister has announced that pubs, restaurants and hairdressers will be able to reopen, providing they adhere to COVID Secure guidelines.

From the same date, he has set out that two households will be able to meet up in any setting with social distancing measures, and that people can now enjoy staycations in England with the reopening of accommodation sites. In order to begin restoring the arts and cultural sector, some leisure facilities and tourist attractions may also reopen, if they can do so safely – this includes outdoor gyms and playgrounds, cinemas, museums, galleries, theme parks and arcades, as well as libraries, social clubs, places of worship and community centres.

These changes apply in England only.

Cornwall Council update by Cornwall Councillor Martyn Alvey

My latest update is being written shortly after the announcement of some fundamental changes to the lockdown rules by Government, which will come into force on Saturday, July 4th. You can find <u>more information here</u>. The reduction of the 2m social distancing rule down to 1m+, where it is safe to do so, will have a significant effect on the hospitality industry, and will allow many businesses to begin trading once more on July 4th for the first time in three months. The ability for



people to stay over in hotels, campsites and bed and breakfast also marks a significant easing of the current restrictions. The opening up of tourism will need to be balanced alongside the need the keep our residents safe, and Cornwall Council will be working with local businesses to ensure that is the case.

The Government has said that it will publish specific guidance for each sector on how to open up the economy safely and we all await that further guidance. However, for Cornwall, the Council wants to reiterate how important it is for people to keep on doing those basic things to keep safe, like washing your hands, maintaining your social distance and being especially considerate to those residents who are cautious, when you are out and about.

Latest official Coronavirus figures for Cornwall

The cumulative number of confirmed cases of Covid19 across Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly stands at 591 as at 15 Jun (Source: UK.GOV) that is 3 additional cases since last reported. A rate of 104 per 100,000, this rate still places Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly the 5th lowest of all top tier Councils in England. Six further deaths have been registered in Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly. The number of deaths involving Covid19 is now 66 in care homes and remains at 18 in the community/at home. There have now been 119 deaths involving Covid19 in hospitals (203 in total accounting for 6% of all deaths).

Cash for communities to kickstart low carbon projects

Community groups can apply for up to £100,000 to fund projects to boost greener living as Cornwall Council launches a new scheme to support low carbon investments. Since January 2019 Cornwall Council has been charging developers Community Infrastructure Levy, or CIL, as a way to reduce any potential adverse impacts on an area resulting from a development. CIL payments are set aside by Cornwall Council to be spent on projects to benefit communities and support development such as in new or improved infrastructure. In Feock, 25% of the levy goes to the parish council where the development has taken place within the parish and so far Cornwall Council has paid £203,900 to local councils through the CIL.

Now Cornwall Council is making available a further £500,000 collected to not-for-profit organisations and constituted community groups, including local councils, who can all bid for funds to pay for infrastructure projects which encourage greener and healthier lifestyles. The new CIL Fund which will be launched on July 1 will hand out grants of £20,000 to £100,000 through a competitive application process. Applicants will need to show how there is local need and community support for their project as well as how it will enable lower carbon living as part of the Council's ambitions for Cornwall to become carbon neutral by 2030. This could include projects such as new pedestrian and cycle paths to improve links around and to community centres, improvements or creation of green spaces using infrastructure, or the adaptation of community buildings to enable multi-use functions such as improved access to health facilities and physical activities.

Infrastructure projects that will help communities recover from the impact of COVID-19 will also be welcomed. The application form and guidance will be available at www.cornwall.gov.uk/cil from 1 July. Deadline for applications is 19 October 2020.

Pupils in Cornwall to get electronic library cards

In what is thought to be a first for UK library services, every Primary School child in Cornwall is being issued with an electronic library card.



The card will give access to a junior version of 'Borrowbox' - Cornwall Libraries' e-book and eaudiobook platform. It will also allow access to the annual Summer Reading Challenge, presented by The Reading Agency. The challenge is delivered in partnership with public libraries and funded by Arts Council England. It encourages children aged 4 to 11 to enjoy the benefits of reading for pleasure over the summer holidays, providing lots of fun, as well as curing what can be a summer reading 'dip'. Cornwall Library and Information Service, although all their libraries are currently closed due to the health pandemic, is giving free access to Junior Borrowbox and its thousands of children's books. Children can read or listen to famous titles from *The* Gruffalo and Elmer, to Harry Potter and books by David Walliams. The Summer Reading Challenge runs from now until mid-September. The card can be used both in school, and at home (on a digital device). Children not in school will be sent instructions by their teachers.

Reopening our high streets

We are sure you will all welcome the opportunity to visit our town centres for the first time since lock-down began. It is a sign of just how much life has changed since then, that many of us have almost forgotten what it feels like to pop out to the shops.

But we should not take the relaxation of some lockdown measures as proof that life has returned to normal – it hasn't, and a trip to your nearest town centre will be a markedly different experience from that of 12 weeks ago.

The risks posed by the virus remain all too real, and this is no time for complacency. As our high streets reopen, each of us will need to play our part in ensuring that we continue to limit the spread of coronavirus and keep the most vulnerable among us safe from infection.

That means observing the rules around social distancing at all times and maintaining good personal hygiene in the form of regular hand-washing.

Your local towns have been working with businesses and other stakeholders to ensure your safety.

Latest Government advice on shielding

People with underlying health issues who are most at risk from Covid-19 will no longer have to shut themselves away in their home and can mix with other people from 6 July in England, the health secretary has said.

Support for people who are undergoing chemotherapy for

cancer, have a damaged immune system or have had an organ transplant will continue to the end of July, said Matt Hancock.

But from 1 August, the 2.2 million "clinically extremely vulnerable" who have been shielding from the virus in England will receive only local authority and voluntary help and can return to their jobs if their workplace is "Covid-secure".

The government says it is safe for the most at-risk to leave their homes, but the new guidance will cause anxiety. Macmillan <u>Cancer</u> Support said its data showed that 45% of people with cancer in England who have been shielding are worried they will be forgotten about as the lockdown continues to ease, while 67% are worried they will not get the help they need.

The government has said the levels of infection in the community have dropped far enough to make it safe for the most vulnerable to go out and meet up to six people who are not part of their household outdoors, while keeping their distance. Ministers say they are committed to maintaining "the unprecedented package of support" until the end of July, to give those shielding time to adjust to the changes. From 1 August, "support will remain available from NHS volunteers and local councils. People will retain their priority for supermarket delivery slots, and still be able to access help with shopping, medication, phone calls and transport to medical appointments," said a statement from the Department of Health and Social Care.

Message from Carnon Downs Surgery

Please read our message from the partners about our new clinical I.T. system and the changes due in the next four weeks.

Dear Patients

In order to improve patient care the surgery is installing a new computer system called "SystmOne - TPP".

Our advised date is the early part of July and we have a dedicated team of personnel working tirelessly to ensure the process runs as smoothly as possible, the new system will bring lots benefits for both patients and our staff.

Urgent Appointments - Please be reassured that access to advice and appointments for urgent medical need will continue to be available on a daily basis throughout the changeover period.

Routine Appointments – These appointments have been reduced at the moment due to the Covid pandemic. During this changeover period of approximately ten days - two weeks (July 6th - 17th) we would appreciate your patience and delay ALL non-urgent medical queries until after the new system has been installed.

Online Services - Access to online services via The Waiting Rm will cease from June 30th 2020 and we will be using a new system called Patient Access.

If you order medication via **The Waiting Rm platform please use either:**

- *** 24hr telephone answering service on 01872 864424 leaving your name, date of birth and list each individual item that you require
- *** post your repeat prescription card request in the box found next to our front door.
- *** If your medication regime is stable, speak to our staff about joining the Advance Pre-order scheme. When you collect your prescriptions, you can select the medicines that you will need next month and agree a date when they will be ready for you. We then process this order without the need for you to order over the phone or via the prescription box as the order is taken at the time of collection.

This is an easy process to get set up but we ask that you attend your reviews when asked otherwise we cannot authorise the medication.

Please allow <u>two/three full working days</u> for your order and note that orders requested after 2.00pm will not be processed until the next working day. We will contact patients in August with details how to sign up for the new system when we have more details.

This will be an extremely challenging time for all our staff and we ask that you bear with us while we learn how to operate the new system and allow us to make sure all of your records have transferred over fully. We will be happy to answer any questions you may have and we ask that you bear with all of our teams at this very critical and important time as some of our services will be reduced.

Thank you for your on-going patience during these few weeks and for all the support the surgery has received during the Covid pandemic.
